

HOLY WEEK & EASTER AT FIRST LUTHERAN CHURCH

Holy Monday, Tuesday, & Wednesday

Holy Week is just that: a Holy Week. Each day we move closer to the apex of Jesus' life and ministry. If you are downtown at mid-day or in the evening, avail yourself of the opportunity to worship and invite friends to join you.

Matins, or Morning Prayer is prayed on Holy Monday and Holy Wednesday at 9:30 AM and takes about 10 minutes.

Each Holy Tuesday, First Lutheran Church and Trinity Episcopal Cathedral, take turns hosting the Chrism Mass for the Southwestern Pennsylvania Synod and the Episcopal Diocese of Pittsburgh. This year, First Lutheran Church will host the liturgy at 10:00 AM. The Holy Eucharist is celebrated, and deacons and pastors/priests are invited to renew their vows of ordination. Our own Bishop Kurt Kusserow will preside and Bishop Ketlen Solak will preach. Together, they will bless the three Holy Oils for the Catechumenate, Healing, and Chrism, which are used in ministry through the coming year. As this liturgy focuses on those in the Holy Ministry, lay people are encouraged to attend in support of our clergy and to renew their own vows of Holy Baptism.

Holy Communion is celebrated on Holy Wednesday at Noonday, beginning at 12:10 PM, lasting about 20 minutes and including music. This day is also known as Spy Wednesday, commemorating the day that Judas secretly plotted to betray Jesus in exchange for 30 silver coins.

Maundy Thursday: Celebration & Sadness

Maundy Thursday is a day of mixed emotion. We rejoice in our Lord's gift of The Holy Eucharist. We recall, in a representative footwashing, his command to love and serve one another as he has loved and served us. And we remember with sorrow what happened after his Last Supper with followers and friends. We recall his betrayal and abandonment, his arrest, and the onset of his suffering.

The most holy week of the Christian Year and the most victorious day are upon us. From darkness to light, from sorrow to rejoicing, Holy Week, the Three Days, and Easter will be observed once again.

Our Maundy Thursday liturgies on April 6 hold our emotions in tension. They begin with solemn joy in our celebration of the Eucharist. But as we worship, we become more and more conscious of the forces of darkness that will sweep our Lord away to his death.

Maundy Thursday liturgies will be celebrated at 12:00 and 7:00 PM. Both will include footwashing, and anyone willing to have their feet washed by a pastor is invited to come forward and do so. The service at noon is a full liturgy of The Holy Eucharist, lasting approximately 45 to 50 minutes. Our 7:00 PM liturgy is the Liturgy of the Lord's Supper. At its conclusion, the altar and chancel are stripped bare, allowing us to consider the agony of our Lord's betrayal and to ponder what lies ahead. The faithful are invited to remain in the church in silent prayer before the tabernacle and the Lord's presence in the reserved Sacrament, remembering our Lord's words to Peter on the night of his arrest, "Could you not stay awake with me one hour?" The Parish Choir will sing. One of their selections will be O Sacred Banquet (O Sacrum Convivium) a Pomeranian Canticle, edited by Pastor Pfatteicher and sung to a musical setting by John W. Becker.

The Liturgy of the Lord's Supper on Maundy Thursday is the first segment of the Paschal Triduum, one great service that is celebrated over the course of three days. The Triduum also includes the liturgies of Good Friday evening and the Vigil of Easter. There is no benediction at the end of Maundy Thursday's worship. It is "to be continued" on Good Friday.

Good Friday Worship in German

First Church maintains a ministry to the German community of Pittsburgh and Good Friday worship in German is part of that ministry. We will again offer a German liturgy of Holy Communion on Good Friday (Karfrietagsgottesdienst), April 7. The service will begin at 10:00 AM. The Rev. Alina Kanaski, pastor of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, Bower Hill, will preach and preside. All are welcome.

Good Friday Worship at Noonday: SERVICE OF PRAYER AND PREACHING The commemoration of our Lord's death includes a Service of Prayer and Preaching on Good Friday,

April 7, at 12:00 PM. This simple, unadorned liturgy includes hymns, readings, the Great Litany, and a sermon.

Following the service, the church will remain open for private prayer and for meditation on the sacrifice of Christ. Scripture tells us that Jesus languished on the Cross from noon until 3:00 PM. We invite the faithful to spend this time in prayer. At 2:30 PM, the time for private prayer and contemplation ends with praying Stations of the Cross.

Good Friday Evening LITURGY OF THE PASSION & DEATH OF OUR LORD:

Our liturgy on Good Friday evening forms the second part of the Paschal Triduum. We will gather at 7:00 PM on April 7 for The Liturgy of the Passion and Death of Our Lord. This service asks us to face death as the consequence of sin. The enormity of Jesus' sacrifice humbles us and asks us to remain with him to the end.

This Good Friday liturgy includes some of the most ancient traditions of the Church. The entire Passion according to Saint John is read in a darkened church. We pray the Solemn Bidding Prayer, specifically appointed for Good Friday. We hear the Reproaches directed to those executing our Lord. We are invited to venerate his holy cross. While we do not celebrate communion on Good Friday, we do receive it in the bread and wine consecrated at the Liturgy on Maundy Thursday. The Tabernacle is emptied and left open, revealing an empty chamber. For a brief time, we experience life without the presence of Christ.

Our Parish Choir will offer choral selections and support for congregational singing. The chancel will be bare. With an emphasis on darkness and silence, the liturgy touches us with sorrow. We ponder the Lamb of God offered for the sins of the world. As on Maundy Thursday, there is no final blessing. We leave in silence and in gratitude for our Lord's offering of himself. Our three-day liturgy continues and comes to completion in the Vigil of Easter on Holy Saturday.

Holy Saturday:

THE GREAT VIGIL OF EASTER

The climax of the Paschal Triduum and focal point of the entire Church Year is The Great Vigil of Easter. On this holiest of nights, we pass from death to life with our Lord. The Easter Vigil begins at 7:00 PM on Holy Saturday, April 8. It is the Christian Passover. From earliest days, this has been the most important liturgy of the Church.

Weather permitting, we will gather in the courtyard. A new fire will be struck for a Service of Light. The Paschal (Easter) Candle will be lighted and will lead the people of God into a darkened church where the Light of Christ scatters the night of sin and death. Through the words of the ancient paschal hymn of praise (The Exsultet), we join all creation in offering thanks to God for the mystery of our redemption.

A Service of Readings features passages from the Old Testament used to instruct candidates for Baptism in the early Church. The lessons provide an overview of God's creative and redeeming activity and help us understand our own passage from death to life in the waters of Baptism.

Then, we ask God's blessing on the water of Baptism and make a Renewal of Baptismal Vows. We recall the grace of our new birth in Christ and affirm the covenant God made with us. We pray a litany asking God for the grace to fulfill the promises made in Baptism.

Finally, the chancel is prepared for Easter, the candles and church are lighted, the organ bursts forth, bells ring, and we sing the Gloria in Excelsis for the first time since Lent began. We break into shouts of joy, singing "Alleluia" as we meet the Risen Lord who comes to us in the first Eucharist of Easter. The Paschal Triduum ends with God's people prepared to return on Easter morning for the celebration of the "Queen of Feasts."

Oftentimes, exuberant worshippers continue celebrating the breaking of the Lenten fast and may be found at the Tap Room in the William Penn Hotel, immediately following the Great Vigil. All are welcome.

Easter Sunday:

THE QUEEN OF FEASTS!

No joy is more compelling or complete than the joy of Christians on Easter Day. Our Lord's victory over death calls forth shouts of "Alleluia" that deafen an unbelieving world. First Church will be adorned with colorful blossoms of new life. Our worship will be vibrant, spirited, and filled with rejoicing.

The Resurrection of Our Lord will be celebrated in festive liturgies of The Holy Eucharist at 8:30 and 11:00 AM on Sunday, April 9. Both will include music by our Parish Choir along with brass and timpani. Between the liturgies, a continental breakfast will be available in Holy Cross Hall. We invite everyone for breakfast and fellowship on Easter Day, The Queen of Feasts.

FINANCIAL SNAPSHOT

Statement of General Fund Activities

For the year ended December 31, 2022

As shown in the chart at right, for the full year of 2022 you continued to faithfully and generously support FLC's ministries. Total revenues of \$796,520 compared to total expenses of \$810,380, resulting in a modest deficit of (\$14,160). Offerings & other Gifts of \$607,119, which consists mostly of envelope giving, were \$17,231 below the \$624,350 budgeted figure for the year.

As another point of comparison, Offerings and other Gifts were higher in 2022 than the 2021 figure of \$592,162, largely reflecting an \$11,408 increase in envelope giving during 2022 compared to the prior year.

Total expenses of \$810,680 were slightly over budget, by \$2,759. Most of this was the result of \$43,000 in unplanned expenses to replace two HVAC units on our roof that had exceeded their useful life. Property Committee is developing a plan for annual replacement of mechanical systems and other needed maintenance, which will be useful in the preparation of budgets in future years.

In the above chart, you will notice that personnel expenses were \$17,461 below budget. This reflects lower than budgeted housing expenses due to our local intern (Vicar) during the 2nd half of the year, and reduced overtime in our housekeeping position. Other savings were realized in Christian Ed and Youth Ministry due to the cancellation of the planned ELCA Youth Convention for the summer of 2022. Lower Parish Administration costs, consisting of supplies, postage and office equipment also contributed significant expense savings during the year.

Distributions and Interest includes transfers from funds which are restricted by purpose as designated by the donor. The largest distribution was received from our own Passavant Fund, which we rely on to support our ministries at First Church. General Fund surpluses and deficits result in transfers into/additional transfers out of the Passavant Fund. Maintaining and growing the Passavant Fund is necessary for the continued support of all of FLC's ministries.

We remain grateful for your abundant and unfailing support of First Church and its ministries and ask that you continue giving as you are able. Please direct any questions, comments, or concerns you may have to the Chair of Finance, Jim Nealon.
