The stone that the builders rejected has become the chief cornerstone. PSALM 188:22

In March I led a retreat for our Confirmation class to Gettysburg and Washington, D.C., where we considered our baptismal calling—the vocations to which God calls us to faithful service in life. We looked at a number of historical figures, some pillars of faith who struggled to put their convictions to work in the building of our American society.

We concluded our retreat with a tour and worship at the Washington National Cathedral—one of the world's largest churches, a massive Gothic structure, which took some 90 years to construct by traditional methods, and, (like our own church), still always seems to be under construction! Ninety years is, in fact, quite a short amount of time for such a project. Many of the great cathedrals of Europe took centuries to complete. Who today, seeing a need for the construction of a church building, would set out to build in such a way? What if the demand (and the funding for a church) is here today but gone tomorrow? What if opinions about it change? What if the unforeseen happens? What if our children and grandchildren and great-grandchildren don't support it?

In 1837, the German poet Heinrich Heine made such an observation:

"Almost no one builds churches this way anymore. When I lately stood with a friend before [the Cathedral of] Amiens, and he beheld with awe and pity that monument of giant strength in towering stone, and of dwarfish patience in minute sculpture, he asked me how it happens that we can no longer build such piles. I replied, "Dear Alphonse, men in those days had convictions; we moderns have opinions, and it requires something more than an opinion to build such a Gothic cathedral."

There is much about our faith that remains a mystery. We are people who walk by faith, not by sight. Yet, the message of Easter handed down to us persists: that a man—the Son of God—was betrayed, suffered, died, and rose again from the dead on the third day. There is no proof of this and there is no guarantee that future generations will believe.

But here we are 2000 years later. Are we, with our forebears in faith, so convicted by the truth of the Gospel and the importance of this message that, no matter the past, the present, or the future, we, in our day and generation, commit our whole selves to this Good News and believe that it is Truth for all time?

CAMP DOWNTOWN REGISTRATION OPEN



'PREPARING' FOR DEPLOYMENT

Alleluia, Christ is risen!

It was a little over two years ago when I first heard the news that my unit was up for deployment. Although I had discerned ministry as a chaplain for many years and knew that someday I would be deployed, I never thought it would come so quickly. Am I ready? Being a

pastor and chaplain, I daily accept that I may not be as prepared as I think I need to or wish to be. Yet, despite my shortfalls and feelings of unpreparedness, God sends me to serve.

Isn't that how it usually works as people of faith? Your family asks you to pray, "What do I say?" A friend is dying, "How do I comfort them?" A coworker asks you a challenging question about scripture, "Wish my pastor was here." We all have those challenging moments when we wish we would have paid more attention in confirmation. Or, we wonder if we have what it takes, despite a lifetime of faith. In our daily life God sends us to serve, ready or not. Consider key figures in scripture who may not have been ready. Moses, his lack of confidence. Jonah, unprepared and unwilling. David, a shepherd, turned king. There is a theme throughout the Bible where God uses those who are unprepared, uncertain and sometimes unfit to do great things.

Imagine being an apostle after the crucifixion... Each of the apostles were called to serve from where they were and likely had little conception as to what their lives would look like after meeting Jesus. After the death of their teacher, they were afraid. They hid, not sure what to do. They weren't prepared to lose him. After his resurrection they were confident in who Jesus was, perhaps less afraid now. They felt assured that Jesus would be with them. Were they ready? Would they know what to say when challenged? Would they know where to go?

From moments of confusion, pain, and loss God sends us to serve. From hard places lined with obstacles, God sends us to serve. From our own death and rebirth through the sacrament of baptism, with the vulnerability of life ahead of us, God sends us forth to serve. When I find myself doing something incredibly difficult, I remind myself that I am capable of doing hard things, because I am never alone. God is with me. God is with us as we live out our vocations in daily living. God is with us when our faith is challenged or we find ourselves feeling unprepared to share the Gospel. Remember that God is the potter, we are the clay vessels through which God is at work.

Am I ready to be deployed? No. Am I prepared? No.

Yet, God has called me to serve. "Here I am Lord, send me."

I am grateful for you, our church family. Be assured that I take each of you with me in my heart as I go from Grant street to share the Gospel.

He is risen indeed! Alleluia!
