

A CALL TO LENT: MEMBERSHIP VS. DISCIPLESHIP

As we enter into the season of Lent, it is again time to turn our focus toward intensifying our discipleship as followers of Jesus Christ. Much has been written and spoken over the years on the idea of membership vs. discipleship. The word *membership* conjures up many images of secular organizations: dues, privileges, rules, bureaucracy. Discipleship, on the other hand, emphasizes following, learning, and worshipping our Lord — all much more faithful-sounding ideas of what the Church should be.

Yet, let us not let the idea of membership be left only to the secular world. St. Paul talks about disciples of Jesus being indispensable members of Christ's body, just as our feet, hands, ears, and eyes, and nose are all necessary parts of our human bodies. All are needed. All these parts serve a purpose in the human body just as each of us serve a purpose in the

Church, Christ's body. You are needed, you are valued, and you are cherished—both by your church family and by God.

We might think about Lent as a time to exercise our body parts—to get our members working together for the common purpose of the Gospel. It is our joy and privilege as members of Christ's body to join together in worship and Holy Communion as often as possible, and to contribute to the wellbeing of the whole Body with our time, talent and treasure. These are the practices, or exercises if you will, that allow us to recognize one another as members of the same Body, working in harmony toward the goal of the Gospel.

This newsletter is filled with ways we can exercise our whole selves—body, mind, and spirit—so that the Spirit may strengthen us and prepare us this Lent for the coming year of discipleship. Rooted in our baptismal calling, I encourage all of us to recommit ourselves to these practices. Let us seek to intensify our discipleship — the basics of our faith — and our faithfulness to Jesus. As they say on the radio, "Make a pledge to renew your membership" this Lent. That is: come and worship, turn to God in prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, that we may be true disciples and members of the Body of Christ in the world.

Honoring an Artist

First Lutheran Church's Organ Artist in Residence, Dr. Ann Labounsky, will be honored at the American Guild of Organists Endowment Fund distinguished Artist Award Recital and Gala Benefit Reception on Friday, April 25.

Dr. Labounsky, longtime Professor of Organ and Sacred Music at Duquesne University will open the festive evening with a performance on the magnificent new Jaeckel pipe organ in the University Chapel of the Holy Spirit. A formal gala reception will follow. Proceeds from the event will benefit the AGO Endowment Fund. Dr. Labounsky has had, and continues to enjoy a remarkable career in the world of organ sacred music. Following organ study at Eastman School of Music and the University of Michigan, she traveled to France for study with renowned organist, Jean Langlais. She wrote an authoritative biography about him (Jean Langlais: the Man and His Music) and over a period of many years, recorded every organ work he composed. She won first place in the AGO's first National Competition in Organ Improvisation. She has toured internationally as a recitalist and lecturer.

Upon arriving in Pittsburgh in the late 1960's, Ann established the degree in Sacred Music at Duquesne, something unique to this area. The program excelled and grew, acquiring national attention and respect from musical colleagues.

Each year, the American Guild of Organists highlights and honors an outstanding colleague. This year, it is most-deservedly Ann. First Lutheran Church gives thanks for her musical contributions to our own parish. Frequently, we are blessed to hear a magnificent improvisation at the Postlude on Sunday morning. She has served as substitute organist and accompanist and teacher. She is a faithful worshipper at liturgies, and her support and encouragement of fellow musicians is a true treasure. We give thanks for Ann's gifts and delight in the honor she will receive on April 25. Please speak to Sr. Cynthia for further information about the recital and reception.

FIRST LUTHERAN CHURCH Statement of General Fund Activities

As shown in the attached chart, during 2024 FLC was blessed by your continued faithful support of our many ministries. Offerings & other gits totaled \$628,571, which was the second highest in our history, behind only the exceptional level of giving during the 2020 pandemic year. While offerings were \$15,089 behind the full year budget, envelope giving, which is the largest component of offerings, was \$608,191, again the second highest in our history.

We were also blessed by an extraordinary gift from the Johnson Family Trust, which was created by Glen and Lavonne Johnson, who for many years were faithful members and supporters of our ministries and capital projects. We received a distribution (included in Distributions and Interest in the above chart) of \$137,500 during 2024 and will receive annual distributions in perpetuity approximating \$125,000. During 2024 we used this gift for the following:

\$45,000 - Replenished the Good Shepherd Fund

This fund is used at the Senior Pastor's discretion to provide financial support to congregation and community members. The fund had been almost fully depleted during 2024.

\$10,000 - Set aside into a separate fund for our youth

The intention of that fund is to support our youths' attendance at the 2027 ELCA Youth Gathering in Minneapolis.

\$15,000 – Did not take this planned 4th quarter distribution from the Passavant Fund

As you may recall, for several years we have needed distributions of \$60,000 each year from the Passavant Fund in order to support our budget. Going forward, we don't anticipate needing distributions from the Passavant Fund to support operations. The extraordinary gift from the Johnson Family Trust will enable us to fully support and grow our ministries, while we replenish the Passavant Fund and allow it to continue growing for the support of future generations of the faithful at First Lutheran Church.

One of my favorite references to our church came from our beloved member Lewis Steele, who appropriately called us the "Miracle on Grant Street". That reference could not be more true. Peace be with you.
